This year marks the end of an 8- year chapter in our family's lives. Briar Hill has been the setting for my girl's formative years, and I feel so grateful for this. I was drawn to the school because it nurtured imagination, wonder and a reverence for childhood. The girls have experienced so much richness and magic at school, which provided them with a holistic and hands on approach to learning that fostered their curiosity and fascination in the world around them. The craft and building projects taught them new skills and a sense of accomplishment. The sense of rhythm and ritual through the days, weeks and years, gave them a sense of security, excitement and anticipation of what was to come as they moved up through the school. The storytelling transformed everyday activities into playful adventures (their recorders were delivered by a pirate in grade 1!) and taught them about creating joy and fun. The sense of community that made events such as the annual Spring Fair happen, showed them what's possible when people come together with a shared vision. Performing in class plays and musical performances has taught them about cooperation, flexibility and the pleasure of collective singing. The teachers showed them love and created a sense of belonging, which provided them with a safe harbour, allowing them to take risks and be brave. The intention and effort invested in creating gorgeous school grounds, gardens and classrooms, that provided the backdrop for their childhood, sparked their imaginations and a deep appreciation of nature. Riding the waves of change when school leadership was transient taught them that challenges are a part of life, they have the ability to influence change and emerge stronger and more resilient.

I am filled with gratitude as we end our Briar Hill chapter. My girls will hold the values they lived at Briar Hill with them forever. To all the families who have shared this chapter with us, it was fun, sometimes messy and hard, but always full of heart! Thank you and all the best for what comes next. Woven together along the way Woven together along the way.




Christmas Craft
